Building on the evidence found in this , it will be crucial to comprehend the global population trends and consequently turn the perspective away from seeing only challenges towards creating opportunities and using these in terms of meeting the SDGs. This will require sound investments in a broad range of social and economic public policies that - in a human rights based manner - ensure, amongst other things, universal access to sexual and reproductive health and rights, education, especially for girls, and employment opportunities in order to make sure that the demographic dividend will indeed be reaped.
