with the substantive participation of the nuclear weapon states. All these steps to need to embark on will strengthen the NPT regime, in line with the obligations under VI, and will contribute towards achieving the TreatyÕs ultimate goal - a world without clear weapons. There is no alternative path or a shortcut to reaching this goal. We act in a sustainable, realistic and responsible manner. Creating conditions for world out nuclear weapons requires that both humanitarian and security considerations en into account. In this regard, we support the statement to be made by Australia I day on the issue of humanitarian consequences.

Bulgaria supports a constructive and realistic, gradual approach, based on practi implementable measures, building-blocks that will strengthen the international disment and non-proliferation regime. Such practical steps could be: overcoming-tl passe in the Conference on Disarmament, including through its enlargement; start gotiations on a Fissile Material Cut-off Treaty, bringing into force the Comprehe Nuclear Test Ban Treaty. We remain convinced that the earliest possible entry into of the CTBT is a crucial step for furthering the nuclear disarmament and non-protion regime.

Furthermore, all obligations related to the NPT Regime should be implemented ir faith. In this context, the breach of the 1994 Budapest Memorandum which guar the territorial integrity of Ukraine was a serious blow to the negative security assu that are key to the viability of the NPT, and must be restored.

As for the non-proliferation aspect, Bulgaria welcomes the political understa reached by E3+3 and Iran on 2 April 2015 and we hope that a mutually acceptable term comprehensive solution will be reached by Juffe 20015.

Unfortunately, DPRKÖs nuclear and ballistic missile programs remain a source of concern for Bulgaria. We urge DPRK to abandon its nuclear weapon program and turn to the NPT and IAEA Safeguards as soon as possible.

We are convinced of the need for tightening of the withdrawal provisions of the Treat as to prevent abuse by states that have been found to be in non-compliance. ternational community should be alerted that some countries might misread Art. feel encouraged not to fulfill their obligations under the Treaty.

Despite the complex situation in the Middle East, efforts for convening a Conferer the establishment of a zone free of nuclear weapons and other weapons of mass tion in the Middle East should continue. In this context Bulgaria welcomes the till efforts of the facilitator, Ambassador Laajava of Finland.
