We strongly agree with the Secretary-General that this must continue to be a top priority for the United Nations and its member States, as this is consistent with the spirit of the core pillars of the UN Charter, particularly regarding the preservation and advancement of international peace and security.

The existence of a multitude of nuclear weapons in the world today poses a serious threat to international peace and security and, indeed, the very survival of humanity. We must all reinvigorate our collective efforts to rid the world of these Weapons of Mass Destruction, which continue to cast a dark and ominous shadow of obliteration and death for humanity.
