Statement to the Sixth Committee of the General Assembly on the Hamilton Shirley Amerasinghe Memorial Fellowship 19 October 2018

Excellencies,

Distinguished delegates,

Ladies and Gentlemen.

It is a pleasure f r the Division f r Ocean Affairs and the Law of the Sea to provide you with an update on the implementation of the Hamilton Shirley Amerasinghe (HSA) Memorial Fellowship on the Law of the Sea.

Capacity-building activities are one of the core f on numerous occasions, most recently in its resolution 72/73 of 5 December 2017, the Assembly recognized, and expressed its appreciation f r, the important contribution to the capacity-building of developing countries and the promotion of the law of the sea made by the HSA Memorial Fellowship.

The Fellowship was established in 1981 to assist government of icials and other professionals from developing States to acquire additional knowledge on the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea, in order to promote its wider application, and to enhance specialized experience in maritime afair and related disciplines.

As of 2018, 32 fellows from 29 developing regional organisations in important for and processes related to ocean af airs and the law of the sea.

From better understanding and effective implement international law of the sea, as reflected in the United Nations Co on the Law of the Sea, its two implementing Agreements and other international instruments, to the implementation of the Sustantial Development Goals, in par icular Goal 14; from the implementation commitments under the Paris Agreement, which noted the import ensuring the integrity of all ecosystems, including oceans, to the participation in the ongoing negotiations under the Introver Conference on an international legal y binding instement under the Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea on the conserval sust inable use of many emblodic I diver it of an as beyond juried at on, the needs are many and the challenges are plentiful.

It is therefore critical that awards under this Fellow implemented continuously consistently and that the necessary fit made available to this end. I note in this regard that, due to in funds, no awards were made from 2007 to 2009, in 2014 and in addition, owing to insufficient funds for a standard award, in 2005 short award was made.

Let me recall that the General Assembly, in its resolution oceans and the law of the sea, urged States, and other stakeholders to make voluntary financial contributions in supported for 2019 and the sea.

We therefor thank States who have made the current and 32 fellowships possible, and strongly encourage voluntary contribusport of future fellows. The Division remains available to adequestion in this regard.
