Mr. Chairman,

- 1. Ghanaaligns itself with the statement of the African Group and the Non Aligned Movement delivered by the distinguished representatives the Kingdom of Morocco and the Islamic Republic of Iran respectively
- 2. Having been along-standing Troop Contributing Country of the United Nations, Ghana welcomeshe discussion by the Sixth Committee thre criminal accountability of United Nations officials and experts on missing would like to make the following remarks.
- 3. At the outset, we wish temphasize themportance of ensuring criminal accountability of UN Personnel whose ctions impinge directly on the integrity and credibility of our organization Member States ave also widely acknowledged that, holding UN Personnel accountable for their actions is necessary for the promotion of he cardinal principle of the Rule of Law within the United Nations ystem.
 - i. We welcome the reportof the Secretar General under this agenda item and express our supportor systemwide coherence and coordination of policies and procedures relating to the reporting, investigate one; ral and follow-up of credible allegations revealing that a crime may have been committed

- ii. We remain supportive of the Secretary policy of zero tolerance for crimes committed by United Nations officials and experts on mission, including thesinvolving sexual exploitation and abused, urge Member States to adopt a similar stare misconduct and criminal acts committed by heir personnel serving with UN Missions.

 All allegations of Sexual exploitation and abuse, corruption, fraud and other forms of misappropriation of funds must be addressed without delay, to ensure that the perpetrators of gound punished and to serve as deterrence to others.
- 4. Second, we reaffirm our support forview thatthe primary responsibility for investigations and prosecutions concerning United Nations officials and experts on missionmust rest with the State of nationality of the official or expert in questionIn this regard, we urgeMember Statesto promulgate requiste national laws hat establish jurisdiction ovesuch criminal acts to ensure accountability by their nationa@n our part,Ghana remainsully committed to theeffective implementation offs Armed Forces Ac(1962) and Code of ServiceDiscipline which both ensure that all allegations of misconduct or crimesnade against its ersonnel ormission are thoroughly investigated and appropriate sanctions plied where culpability has been established.

- 5. Third, we underscore the need for continuent for to address jurisdictional gaps. Also, factors which obstruct effective accountability measures at national levels such as the late submission of evidence, loss of evidence and sometimes the refusal by inctims and witnesses to testify must be addressed through enhanced cooperation between concerned Membe States and the United Nations
- 6. Fourth, we believe thatstrengtheningpreventive measures and enisgr effective protection, especially women and gls who may be vulnerable to sexualabuse is crucial to reducing the courrence of criminal conduct by UN personnel to its barest. Rigorous induction and isservice training on acceptable standards of conduct and repercussions or violating those standards must herefore sustained for all levels personnel. We have taken note of the training package which is to be made available in all official United Nations language clock forward to further information on its overall impacts service conduct do not personnel.
- officers of the highest professional and ethical standards are deployed for UN Missions in support of global effrts to promote and maintain international peace and ecurity
