Ø2/3 of land covered by forests

ØSteep terrain and high precipitation

- J Heavy reliance on environmental services
- J Increasing concern about climate change





Figure 1: Public Expectation on forests




1. Our Forests and Our Challenges

1. Our Forests and Our Challenges(3) Dominance of small holders

Ø60% of forests privately owned

- Ø 90% of private forest owners own less than 10ha
- Ø Discouraged by continuously declining profitability
 - J Revitalization of forests and forestry needed



2. Our Efforts to Mobilize Resources(1) Tackle to budgetary expansion

Ø Public concern about increasing unmanaged planted forests

Ø Maximum use **Mobilize**

- 2. Our Efforts to Mobilize Resources(2) Attempts to internalize environmental services
 - Ø Concern about unmanaged local planted forests
 - Ø Addressing local benefits from forests
 - J Rapid expansion of local taxation for forest
 - 30 out of 47 prefectures introduced since 2003

- 2. Our Efforts to Mobilize Resources(3) Efforts to facilitate public collaboration
- Ø Incorporation of public willingness into actions
- Ø Legislation of activities effectively worked
 - J Nationwide fund raising campaign for forests "Green Donation Campaign"

- Ø Public awareness and support is fundamental
 - J Transparency and accountability is critical
 - J Effective and timely MAR/MRV needed
 - J Public participation and collaboration contribute
- Ø Good governance of forests is prerequisite
 - J Policy frameworks and institutional capacity are essential
- Ø Tireless efforts for innovative measures is required
 - J Efforts at all levels




