

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Mr. Chairman,

Malta would like to join other delegations in expressing our deepest sympathy and sincere condolences to the Government and People of Chile in the wake of the tragic events.

Malta welcomes the Declaration adopted by this Commission last Tuesday and reiterates Malta's commitment to the goal of gender equality and the empowerment of women and girls. Challenges to achieve this commitment remain. Yet, Malta intends to work with vigour and determination with the other UN Member States to face these challenges with the aim of ensuring that the goals of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action are achieved.

Malta reiterates its view that safeguarding equal treatment between men and women in all spheres is fundamental for equality of opportunities for both genders. In pursuance of this objective, the Maltese Government has taken different measures to integrate the gender perspective into national development strategies.

Whilst recognising that equality between women and men is crucial to sustainable growth, employment, competitiveness and social cohesion, the Maltese Government is committed to taking further measures to strengthen gender balance in the country and ensuring the growing presence of women in society, especially in key positions.

The Maltese Government has taken different measures to allocate resources to promote equality of opportunities to both genders in relation to the implementation of the critical areas delineated in the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action as well as the Millennium Development Goals.

On Monday, the Vice Minister for Equality of Opportunities addressed a meeting on behalf of the Chair of the EU Member States. In this context, my delegation will continue to take this into account in Malta's position with respect to the issue of sexual and reproductive rights at the concluding meeting.

As it did in numerous international conferences including the Fourth World Conference on Women held in Beijing fifteen years ago, Malta would like to reiterate today, no matter what any position taken or recommendation regarding women's empowerment and gender equality should not in any way create an obligation on any party to consider abortion as a legitimate form of reproductive health rights, services or commodities. Malta continues to hold the view that an open discussion of rights and services in connection with reproductive rights must take place within the framework of one of the most fundamental of human rights – the right to life. Malta strongly believes that the right to life extends to the unborn child from the earliest stages of conception, and that therefore the use of abortion as a means of reproductive rights must be prohibited under the right.

It is within this framework of human rights – the right to life – that Malta has in these last fifteen years held high the Beijing Platform for Action. It is therefore in this spirit and commitment that Malta will continue to implement the relevant objectives of international instruments including the Beijing Platform for Action.

In line with the Beijing Platform for Action, Malta dedicates particular importance to the family and its role as the 'basic unit of society'. It is Malta's view that the family must continue to play a crucial role in the family. By empowering women the role of the family is strengthened. In this regard, Malta has enacted policies and measures to encourage more women to enter or remain in the labour market. These include offering training to young mothers who leave the labour market, providing fiscal measures to mothers who return to the labour market after a five year absence and incentives for employment among those who have not been absent for five years; eradicating child day care services, with the exception of day care facilities run with private business without Government regulation; and extending maternity leave for female workers. Malta also provides provisions in the emergency framework for workers who are unable to work due to the birth of a child or for carers who are collecting the medical attention of their child for life.

Malta has mechanisms set up at national and local levels to safeguard equal treatment between genders and to strengthen the national commitment for gender equality. In this regard, the National Commission for the Promotion of Equality (NCPE) implements different measures that integrate the gender perspective in national development strategies. The involvement and participation of a diverse range of stakeholders in this process constitutes an effective collaborative and crucial dimension of the National Commission, supported by the sharing of information, mutual learning and capacity building, thus engendering a stronger political commitment and leadership which is fundamental to ensure a greater priority to gender equality and empowerment of women. Malta also feels that data collection and disaggregation of sex-disaggregated data would strengthen the development of policies that are sensitive to circumstances and needs of both genders.

Malta supports and is a party to the international initiative to end violence against women. At the national level, through the amendment in 2006 of the Domestic Violence Act, Malta is addressing address with vigour and determination this indefensible social malpractice by enhancing the protection, restraining and treatment order of victims in all perpetrators in dealing with domestic violence. Furthermore, the Equality for Men and Women Act, provides adequate protection, assistance and support, to women who suffer from such a traumatic experience.

Results of the last Census of the National Statistics Office of Malta indicate that in the areas of ageing, marriage, education, qualifications, employment, independence and computer access, women with disabilities tend to be at a greater risk when it comes to gender equality. Conscious of such a reality, Malta continues its efforts to explore new ways of combatting the differences in the quality of life of men and women with disabilities.

Encouraged by the advancements made in recent years, gender mainstreaming is a national priority that will continue to play a catalytic role in guaranteeing equal treatment for both genders in all policies and measures. The exchange of ideas and sharing of experiences and good practices between States can be crucial in overcoming differences and finding greater convergence on actions and solutions.
