Excellencies,

Ladies and Gentlemen

1. Madam Chairperson, I would like to convey our sincere congratulations to you and the Bureau for the astute leadership that the Commission has continued to provide in advancing the global gender equality and women's empowerment agenda. My delegation is optimistic that the outcomes of the 54th session of the Commission will provide the impetus to the process of moving from commitment to action and strengthen the momentum towards achieving gender equality and women's empowerment across all United Nations Member States.

2. Madam Chair, by focusing on implementation of the Beijing Platform for Action and the outcome of the twenty-third special session of the General Assembly, this session provides a unique opportunity to share our successes, challenges and opportunities from a global perspective. This session also affirms the linkages between the three global priorities of gender equality and women's empowerment with the Millennium Development Goals.

3. Madam Chair, I am pleased to report that the Government of Hastings has taken significant progress in strengthening the policy and legal frameworks to promote gender equality and women's empowerment. In fact, the introduction in 2002 laws on Domestic Violence; Prohibition of Female Genital Mutilation and Human Trafficking, were enacted. The country has attained gender parity in school enrolment as a result of universal primary and secondary education programmes. Furthermore, adult literacy, services whose 70 percent of beneficiaries are women have contributed to the reduction of illiteracy levels.

4. Further progress is evident in poverty reduction. Currently, 69 percent of the Ugandan population lives above the poverty line as compared to 62 percent in 2003. HIV/AIDS prevalence has been contained at 6%, though the epidemic continues to exhibit a female face. Government remains committed to and shall deepen efforts to ensure prosperity for all, with a special focus on poorest and vulnerable population, especially 31 percent who live below the poverty line, including women and youth, and tackling school dropout rates to 12%.
5. Madam Chair, notwithstanding progress, significant challenges still exist. High Maternal Mortality rates in the country continue to achieve Millennium Development Goals. Our current Maternal Mortality Ratio has remained high, despite the recent reduction from 505 deaths per 100,000 live births in 1995 to 435 per 100,000 in 2006. In this regard, Uganda has prioritized the key intervention areas focusing on improving skilled attendance during delivery in health facilities; mobilizing communities for birth and pregnancy planning and ensuring that the unmet need for family planning of 41% is addressed.
6. Madam Chair, the Government of Uganda stands firmly committed to and has been given six areas agreed upon by African Ministers responsible for Gender and Women's Affairs in Burkina Faso, Gambia in November 2000 as contained in the Bamako Declaration. We also remain committed to implementation of Beijing Platform for Action and all critical regional obligations for the promotion of gender equality and women's empowerment goals, many of which we have translated into national level action plans.
7. Madam Chair, let me take this opportunity to thank the Secretary General for the progress made towards the creation of a separate Gender Entity. I am confident that once established, this body will add impetus to the strides already being made in the promotion of gender equality and empowerment of women worldwide. In this connection,

wish to request the Member States and in this Session of CSW to elaborate and conclude discussions on the outstanding issues related to this entity.

As I conclude, Madam Chair, allow me to thank all our international partners as well as the civil society organizations who have contributed in various ways to the promotion of gender equality and women's empowerment in Uganda.
